GHOST TOWN TOUR

JUNE 2010 GHOST TOWNS TOUR

We have some great news! The June 5-6 Ghost Towns tour is on! You are familiar with Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid, right? They were leaders of the famous Hole-in-the-Wall Gang that terrorized banks and trains in this area in the 1890's and early 1900's. You may not be so familiar with the Johnson County War of 1892 in northern Wyoming, in which big cattle barons imported 50 hired gunmen from Texas to drive the settlers out of the country. They killed two or three settlers, then the settlers holed them up in the T-A Ranch barn, until the gunmen were rescued by the U S Cavalry, no less. There are still local hard feelings about it. Well, the trip is ON. We are going to visit:

1. The beautiful Hole-in-the-Wall - an amazing 500-foot high sandstone wall, 30 miles long, with a narrow trail winding up it. This trail is the actual Hole-in-the-Wall, where the gang would climb after robbing a train or bank. Then they would leave a gunman there with a .30-30 to hold off the posses chasing them. The posse would look at an impossible situation and go home! This is in the middle of an 83-section private ranch. This is the opportunity of a life-time - something you will never be able to repeat!

2. The T-A Ranch, where the Johnson County War hired gunmen were besieged by the settlers until the gunmen were rescued by the U S Cavalry. The huge old barn is still standing, complete with bullet holes from the siege! It's all in the middle of a beautiful guest ranch.

And that ain't all! We're also visiting the ancient 800-year-old Indian Medicine Wheel up in the gorgeous Bighorn Mountains. And there's more, folks!

HERE'S THE ITINERARY:

SATURDAY, June 5:

Take a 2-hour drive from Spearfish (3 hours from Rapid City).

10 am. BRUNCH at Pistol Pete's in Buffalo, Wyoming.

Afternoon - The Hole-in-the-Wall. This is for 4-wheel-drive vehicles, folks (NO ATV'S!), so we'll work it out so everyone gets a ride. TAKE A CAMERA, as there's lots to see, including llamas guarding sheep flocks and an old robbers' cabin out in the middle of nowhere. And the scenery is wonderful. Also, take your old cowboy clothes (and if possible an Old West rifle - EMPTY), as you'll want to get photos of yourself and everyone else "holdin' off" the posse at the Hole-in-the-Wall.

Evening - dinner at The Virginian, a FA-MOUS old Western restaurant in Buffalo. The menu looks OUTSTANDING, with such things as great beef or BUFFALO steaks.

GOLD IN

GOLD

Crystals form as cubes or octahedra, but distinct examples are rare. The usual habits are as grains, flakes, nuggets, and dendritic masses. The bright, rich yellow color is resistant to tarnishing. Gold is often rich in silver, when it is paler in color. The streak is goldenyellow. Gold is opaque, and its luster is metallic.

• FORMATION Forms mainly in hydrothermal veins, often associated with quartz and sulfides. It also occurs in placer deposits of unconsolidated sand, and in sandstone and conglomerate. It is possible to find alluvial gold in grains or nuggets, in stream beds. Panning for gold by sifting the sediment is an age-old method of looking for this rare and valuable mineral. Gold

can be confused with pyrite and chalcopyrite at first, but only a few tests are needed to identify it.

NEW CLAIMS UPDATE

Okay, we have been getting a lot of calls and e-mails from members wanting to know if there are any new club claims. The answer is **YES** the Good-One claim in the Northern Hills in the Tinton area. **BUT** as it stands right now this claim is **VERY HARD** to get to! And in a **VERY** remote area!

The Club Officers will be working on finding an easier, safer access route to the claim this season.

When we have a good, safe route to the claim we will send a map and directions page to add to your member booklet, **THEN** the claim be ready for use by ALL members.

This claim will be PAN and SLUICE ONLY !!! We will be watching this claim closely!

BHPC Mining Etiquette & Claim Rules

- 1.No open fires are allowed within the National Forest unless in an approved camping area.
- 2.Remember to pick up trash / Pack it in Pack it out. 3.No loud noise (i.e. generators/music/tv's) during the hours of 10pm thru 7am
- 4.MINING ETIQUETTE:
- a. Respect work areas of you fellow prospectors.
- b. Work area shall be defined as a 10-foot radius from the center of the area being worked.
- c. A work area can be (Reserved) for up to 48 continuous hours from the time work began. Tools and equipment shall be a marker to show work area is being used.
- d. Fill in your holes before you leave the claim.
- e. No tunneling / knocking down overburden before you leave the claim.
- f. All flammable liquids (gas) shall be kept a minimum of 20-feet from the center of creek / stream.

-- IMPORTANT NOTICE --

There are to be NO vehicles over 54 inches wide past the steel posts at the Garnet claim. This access trail is a foot path and for ATV's 54 inches wide and under.

The Black Hills Prospecting Club (BHPC) reserves the right to refuse or revoke membership to anyone at any time.

ALL BHPC claims are Panning and Sluicing ONLY!

The exception is the Garnet claims area, here you can use other equipment in designated areas ONLY! The rest of the claim is panning and sluicing only.
